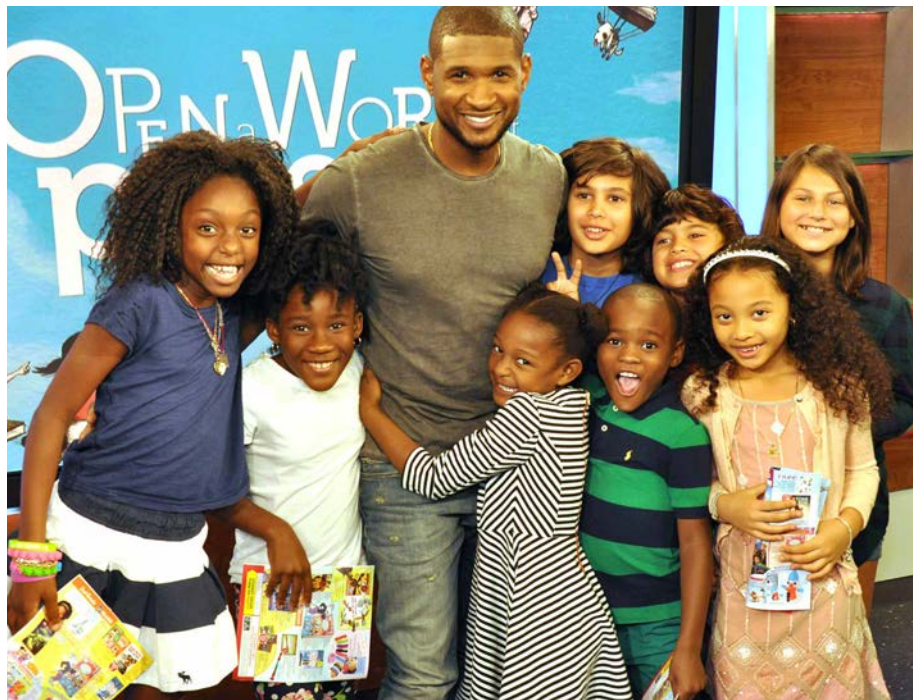


What Can You Do With a World of Possible?
